Moo Juice

Hey, Shoppers - do you ever wonder if the city would permit you to harbor a cow on your property? (Besides providing milk, it could graze your lawn and eliminate a mower!) Does your family consume one gallon or more of milk per day at the usual price of \$2.09-\$2.29/ gal.? Well, I've discovered a milk depot right here at Grandland. Kent Drugs (next to Great Scott) sells gallons of 1/2% @ \$1.55, 2% @ \$1.75, and homogenized @ \$1.79. These even come in plastic containers - not those awkward cardboard ones. You can usually park right alongside of the store and run in and out. This eliminates a onehour stop at the grocery store which inevitably costs \$32.95 (but I only needed milk!). They also carry other staples like bread and eggs - Caution: Do not stop at the candy counter!

Distribution boundaries include the Grandmont Subdivision - Grand River south to Schoolcraft and Southfield east to Asbury Park, approximately 1,200 homes and businesses.

Nursery Group Tours Supermarket

Rosedale Park Cooperative Playgroup's 4-year-olds recently toured the Farmer Jack's Supermarket at 8 Mile and Grand River. In nursery school the children had been learning about the five food groups. They expanded their knowledge of foods with a "behind-the scenes" look at a grocery store. They visited the Farmer Jack's warehouse where they saw cartons of food waiting to be placed on the shelves. They saw peanut butter as it was made in the store's delicatessen, bread baked in giant ovens in the bakery, and meats cut, packaged and labelled in the butchers' area.

As a related activity, the children set up their own grocery store in nursery school with empty boxes brought from home. According to nursery director, Sally Fee, in "playing store", pre-schoolers develop social skills as they take turns being cashiers or customers in line. They learn cooperation when selecting food or restocking shelves. Categorization skills are practiced as children decide which items belong in the freezer and which in the refrigerator section of the store Cognitive skills are utilized in pursuing the question of just what would happen to milk if it were kept in the freezer. Children learn about seration (or building small-to-large) when they telescope small cans and boxes into large ones at the end of the nursery day. Language skills are also furthered as the children name and talk about foods with each other.

FEVER BLISTERS

- Q: Why do I get fever blisters? What causes them?
- A: Some people are occasionally bothered by cold sores or fever blisters. These sores are usually caused by a herpes virus. They will arise on the lips and skin around the mouth, causing pain, itching, and crusting. They last one to two weeks and then heal, only to recur.


Most people are infected with herpes as infants. These children are quite ill, with a severe rash all over the mouth and throat, often with high fever. After the infection subsides, the virus retreats in some patients and hides out in certain nerves. When resistance is low, the virus creeps down the nerve and affects the skin.

There is no cure. Wait for the sores to heal. Medication containing any form of cortisone should not be used, as these can spread the virus. Touching the sore should be avoided, as the virus is contagious and can be spread by contact.

Spotlight: George Cook, Art Teacher

As a parent, one thing made me happy when I heard Mr. Cook was bumped from his position as Art Teacher at Ludington Middle School, my eldest son's school. I soon found out that he was going to be Art Teacher at Dossin Elementary School, my other son's school (at Abington and Glendale, south of Schoolcraft).

All Grandmont children south of Kendall go to Dossin if they attend public school. They have all had an opportunity to meet Mr. Cook. He has brought a whole new awareness of the value of art education to Dossin School.

Who is George Cook? He grew up in Birmingham, Alabama, and went to college at Highland Park Community College and WSU. He is now completing his Master's degree at Wayne State. He has taught five years in the Detroit Public Schools in SW Detroit, on the east side, and at Ludington and Dossin here in Region 4.

Mr. Cook not only teaches art, he paints. His specialty is murals. "My life's goal is to paint the world's largest mural." He has painted murals at several schools, mostly in Highland Park. His outdoor murals have attracted quite a bit of attention: "Kids are People Too" at Grand River and Arlene; "Knowledge is Power" at Joy and Whitcomb; "Black Athletes" at Kercheval and McClellan; "Reading is to the Mind..." at Harper and Burns. These outdoor murals have not been defaced - "They make some things not heard about in school more concrete," says Mr. Cook.

Mr. Cook has definite ideas about teaching art. In primary grades he tries to impart an understanding of basic shapes and how they can be used to make pictures. The older children learn crafts and stitchery first, and then go on to drawing and painting. Mr. Cook has little trouble with discipline - "I make art as enjoyable as possible because I love it so much. I don't let it get boring. If an art teacher is not an active art teacher, art will always be boring. You have to be a creative person yourself."

Art is low on the list of priorities in many schools these days. I asked Mr. Cook why art is important to the elementary school child. He said that for children, art is an everyday thing they use it when they get dressed and when they identify objects. Working with their hands produces coordination and also a kind of satisfaction that many kids don't find in academic subjects. Art can give children something to strive for - some kids want to go to school just to go to art, says Mr. Cook.

An Art teacher is also valuable to the other teachers and school as a whole. This summer Mr. Cook plans on painting two murals at Ludington and hopefully some at Dossin.

The current round of lay-offs makes the future uncertain for Mr. Cook. If he is laid off, he will put more time into his art work. He is now a member of the Artists' Co-Op on Grand River, where photographs of his murals, prints and watercolors are for sale. As a member of the Co-Op, he plans to set up panels for kids to paint a mural at the Grandmont Arts and Crafts Fair '82.

After talking to Mr. Cook for an hour, I was very impressed by his spirit, love for art, and concern for children. I'm sure we all wish him the best, and I have a feeling he'll find it. He told me his "secret of happiness is to enjoy what you're doing." Art is what makes Mr. Cook happy.


